Florida A&M University Board of Trustees Direct Support Organization Committee Meeting

Wednesday, April 10, 2013 Grand Ballroom

The meeting was called to order at 2:49 p.m. by Committee Chair Belinda R. Shannon. Ms. Angie Wiggins called the roll and the following committee members were present: Committee Vice Chair Kelvin Lawson, Trustee Glen Gilzean, Trustee C. William Jennings, Trustee Rufus Montgomery, and Trustee Marjorie Turnbull. A quorum was established.

Review and Approval of the February 6, 2013, Committee Minutes

The Committee reviewed the minutes from the February 6, 2013, Direct Support Organization (DSO) Committee Meeting. Vice Chair Kelvin Lawson moved approval of the minutes and the motion was seconded by Trustee Marjorie Turnbull. The motion carried.

Update on Divisional Activities

The Associate Vice President of University Advancement, Mrs. Shirley Range, and staff provided the committee with an update on several items within the division of University Advancement. These include:

- The Office of Alumni Affairs Executive Director, Mrs. Carmen Cummings Martin, presented a summary of alumni activities from February to May 2013. The presentation included the following upcoming events:
 - o April 11th, 5-6:30PM, the FAMU NAA will host FAMU Day at the Capitol, with an evening reception on the 22nd Floor. The FAMU Student Government collaborated with the NAA in sponsoring the cost of shuttling students and alumni from campus to the Capitol. The annual event provides an opportunity to convey concerns about the University's budget priorities.
 - May 2nd-4th, Weekend of Rededication celebrating the Golden Anniversary Class of '63. Board of Trustees (BOT) Chairman, Dr. Solomon L. Badger, and the 7th FAMU President, Dr. Walter Smith, are among the Golden classmates who will be saluted that weekend.
 - May 16th-18th, the FAMU NAA Conference will be held in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Two main events include a town hall meeting with numerous university officials on the panel to talk about the state of FAMU; and the University President's fundraising luncheon to garner dollars in support of FAMU.
- The FAMU Rattler Boosters Director, Mr. Mickey Clayton, shared with the Committee an update on Boosters' membership, and contributions to Athletics. The average number of current Booster membership is down slightly but financial contributions are running ahead. A factor that could possibly have contributed to this was the minimum level of parking within Bragg Stadium that went from a venom level (\$250 membership) to the next Booster contribution level, Diamond Back (\$500 membership). That is also the reason contributions are running ahead because of the restructuring of the lot based on the closeness of the parking spot locations and completes the five year plan that was in place to move the Diamond Back minimum level membership and parking.

At the current time, the Boosters have contributed \$197,700 to Athletics, up from the \$150,000 from the previous year. New initiates include release of the May Edition Snake Bite Magazine, and the Annual Report. They are also in the process of releasing license plate parking name tags and membership shirts.

Trustee Shannon advised that in the Budget and Finance Committee Meeting there was an extensive conversation regarding Athletics and finances related to Athletics. She inquired to what extent would boosters benchmark against other comparable university programs to determine if all basis are covered, updating all of the engagement levels with boosters, and a way to increase the number of individuals who participate in increasing revenues from the boosters - has this been conducted; if not, are the Rattler Boosters prepared to do?

Mr. Clayton responded that in terms of athletics, it's different from state to state. For example, at FSU's Booster organization, whom a lot of Rattler Boosters' policies are derived from, within their parking lot the minimum level for parking within FSU's stadium is \$6,000; FAMU's is less than 10% of that at \$500. Among HBCU's, Rattler Boosters is one of the leaders frequently called within the MEAC by others to inquire how it does what it does. In terms of HBCU's, Rattler Boosters is doing well. In terms of comparing it to some of the other institutions within the state of Florida, still lagging behind with some of them.

Trustee Shannon had Mr. Clayton to name three things FAMU need to do to inject life, energy and growth into the Boosters program. His response was expanding parking on game day is key to the growth of the Boosters club. Also, designation of Rattler Boosters to control sales of the marketing inventory would allow larger opportunity to give additional funding to Athletics.

Trustee Shannon also inquired of Mr. Clayton if there is a virtual Boosters club that would allow FAMU alumni and supporters not on campus an opportunity to participate. He advised that they have a lot of supporters nationwide who do not attend games but who are booster members; participate through the Boosters website.

Trustee Rufus Montgomery posed a two-part question to Mr. Clayton: 1) as a support organization, how much money does FAMU directly provide the Boosters; he responded, "my salary". 2) to support FAMU, would he be opposed to allowing FAMU to retain that money so that it may go to other critical areas, and have the Booster organization take his money out of it in terms of self-sustaining support. Mr. Clayton's response was "no, I can raise my salary".

In regard to the increase in parking prices, Chairman Solomon Badger wanted to know if any kind of direct communication was mailed out; Mr. Clayton advised that notification was sent a year ago.

The Foundation Director of Investments, Mr. Michael Brown, provided a comparison of
investment returns for the period ended September 30, 2012, in terms of composite benchmark and
investment goal. He also presented a comparison of investment returns for calendar year-to-date to
prior years. Asset allocation guidelines, target allocations, and the investment return goals remain
unchanged.

Mr. Brown was asked to explain what the composite benchmark show the Committee. The composite benchmark is a representative ratio of each of the different asset classes to the overall return. Trustee Shannon inquired how often does FAMU change its investment mix, and asked if there is a set amount of time investment results are reviewed. Mr. Brown advised that the Investment Committee meets quarterly to review actual investment results.

Trustee Cleve Warren asked if the Foundation is managing its own portfolio; per Mr. Brown, the Foundation has an investment advisor and is also transitioning to a new investment advisor after

going through an extensive RFP process. Trustee Warren inquired if the Board has seen the composition of the Foundation's investments. Mr. Brown advised that a full report was provided that showed the asset allocation of the investment managers. Mr. Brown was asked to forward to Trustee Warren the asset allocation, and he will also send the guidelines and target allocations.

Trustee Montgomery inquired as a direct support organization, how much money does FAMU give to their organization. Mr. Brown responded that the Foundation is self-sustaining and provides support to the university; his particular position is paid 75 percent by the Foundation and 25 percent by the university/state through the E&G budget. Trustee Montgomery further inquired how many positions are paid for by FAMU. Per Mr. Brown, his position only, and reminded the Committee that the advancement staff once on the Foundation's budget until June 30th were just moved off. It was not only staff of the Foundation but development officers positions that were being funded by the Foundation as well.

Trustee Marjorie Turnbull inquired if the unfunded obligation to the Foundation referenced a few meetings ago had been resolved now that the investments are going up. Mr. Brown responded that because of where things are today, it would actually be eliminated; however, the Foundation Board has not added at this time to segregate those funds. Should be considered soon; the Foundation's Finance and Investment Committees are working on this. Trustee Turnbull advised she raised this issue because this Board needs a full understanding of the impact of its decisions on the Foundation budget. Before the FAMU budget is finalized, need to know how the Board's decisions of calling upon the Foundation for additional funds and what the Board needs to be cognizant of before making decisions.

The FAMU Foundation is currently in the process of filling four vacancies, and are preparing for the Foundation Spring 2013 Board of Directors Meeting here in Tallahassee, April 17-19. The Foundation Stakeholders Luncheon and Meeting to be held during the board meeting was cancelled. The Foundation Building Open House is on April 18th. Staff is in discussion with potential tenants regarding occupying space in the building. A copy of the 2011 Annual Report of the FAMU Foundation was presented and provided to the BOT.

Mrs. Shirley Range recognized student representative and Senate President-Elect, Ms. Tonnette Graham, and Trustee Michael Jefferson. They both spearheaded the planning and organization of the student organization board. An update on the FAMU Student Foundation was presented by Trustee Jefferson. It is a student-driven, student founded, and student focused entity whose purpose is to provide funds to ensure students can be retained. It is managed by a nine member student board, administered by the FAMU office of University Advancement, and the account is managed through the FAMU Foundation.

Trustee Warren inquired about where the source of revenue for the student foundation will come from; the response was from fundraising and in-kind donations. He offered to the student foundation to explore a concept called Giving Circle.

Foundation staff is working with the office of University Advancement's Donor Relations staff in putting together an annual stewardship report for Endowments, which are scheduled for distribution in July.

In regard to the progress on the strategies outlined under BOT Goal Number 4: Enhance Institutional Fundraising, the Committee was presented overarching strategies to increase fundraising outcomes; efforts to increase fundraising capacity; notable developments; the current status of giving by University Trustees (69% participation: 9 out of 13 members), FAMU Foundation Directors (50% participation: 14 out of 28 members), and FAMU alumni (6%

participation: 3,300 out of appx. 55,000 living alumni of record); and a plan to enhance corporate sponsorships of athletic programs. As of March 22, 2013, the third quarter for this fiscal year, the Division has raised \$2.54M or 56% of the third quarter goal, and 48% of the assigned \$5.5M fundraising goal. A year-to-date comparison of FY 2011-12 and FY 2012-13 revealed the Division is 4% behind fundraising performance last year this time.

Mrs. Range advised that the division is desperately trying to make sure that it hit or exceed the \$3.2M raised last year. Trustee Warren asked if a demographic survey of alumni has been conducted to use to drive the approach and at what amount; Mrs. Range responded, yes. Have worked with the office of Alumni Affairs and have done a distribution look geographically and for trends among the decades. Contact is now needed to get the full satisfaction of the demographic regions.

Trustee Tory Alston inquired if there is a mechanism where contact information for every graduate is currently captured. Mrs. Range advised that University Advancement receives a report directly from the registrar's office of every new graduate. Seek to keep a hand on them by inducting them as members of the alumni association. Trustee Alston also stated that there is a drop off with the initial contact info. in the registrar's office and wanted to know what is being done to track graduates whose contact information changes after graduation. Mrs. Range advised it's difficult, but there are ways they conduct refreshes for data on alumni and constituents - through Alumni Finders, and phon-a-thons.

Update on Anti-Hazing & University Marketing Campaign

An update on anti-hazing and the university marketing campaign was presented by the President for the interim, Dr. Larry Robinson, and his team. The administration has been working to implement new procedures that were outlined in the Updated FAMU Anti-Hazing Plan. Dr. Robinson advised that guidelines are in place to better monitor the academic progress of students in the marching band and other ensembles in the Department of Music.

Dr. Robinson informed the Committee that hazing complaints continue to come in through the university's website. Bryan Smith, special assistant to the president for anti-hazing, provided an update on hazing complaints.

In the first semester (September – December 2012), 20 cases of hazing complaints were reported and 20% resulted in suspensions, and in the second semester (February – April 2013), 16 allegations of hazing complaints were received through the university's website. Some of the cases are currently under investigation by both Judicial Affairs and law enforcement; some have been deemed unfounded (as related to hazing) by law enforcement but FAMU officials are awaiting a determination by Judicial Affairs; others were deemed unfounded by law enforcement so the academic department rescinded the initial suspension; and a case was determined to not be prosecutable by the State Attorney's Office, but Judicial Affairs has initiated hearings based on potential student code of code violations.

Trustee Shannon inquired of Mr. Smith if there are any other portals students can use to report hazing. Mr. Smith responded that they could call his office, or call 911.

Mr. Smith further advised that they are working with the Board of Governors on hazing related issues in the corrective action plan. They have communicated the anti-hazing policy to students and to the department of music faculty, ROTC cadre, university deans, as well as to advisors of all clubs and organizations.

Mr. Smith advised that a revision is being made to the code of conduct language. Trustee Shannon stated that it would be good for Mr. Smith to be on the Code of Conduct Committee. Trustee Spurgeon

Williams advised that the code of conduct need to be reviewed to make sure we are doing the right thing. Need to understand what it is when it's not a hazing violation and what the penalty distribution should be. Trustee Shannon stated that there is a need to make sure that the consequences fit whatever is going on, and not to give a false sense of security to any student at this organization. If students commit any ethical or serious code of conduct issue, they will be terminated immediately regardless of their contributions, or how close they are to graduation. Trustee McWilliams advised to make sure that the consequences are consistent.

Trustee Montgomery echoed comments made by Trustee McWilliams and advised to make sure the punishment fits the crime. Trustee Turnbull's comments were to be very cautious, and for the Board to not do anything that implies it is not deadly serious about eliminating hazing on this campus and students need to know it is dead serious and will tolerate nothing. Trustee Jefferson spoke of the student code of conduct and disciplinary actions, then echoed both sides of comments from the trustees. He further advised he understands there are needs to protect the university but also needs to protect the students to provide for a safe environment and an environment for which the punishment fit the crime. Mr. Jefferson made the suggestion that Mr. Smith be appointed to the Code of Conduct Committee.

Trustee Alston let the Committee know that the penalties and code of conduct will be discussed at the Student Affairs Committee meeting and asked that comments be held until that committee meeting.

Dr. Robinson stated that they continue to work to educate students about their responsibility in an effort to stop hazing on campus. An anti-hazing workshop was held and students were encouraged to continue to help the university in its effort to eradicate out hazing.

This week, candidates will be interviewed for the director of Marching and Pep Bands position.

Mrs. Sharon Saunders, special assistant to the president for Communications, provided an update regarding the **Marketing and Communication Plan**. She advised that the university is well on its way to completing its procurement process to hire a firm for repositioning the university through an advertising and marketing campaign. She further stated that an intent to hire the Edelman firm has been posted. If no protests are received, they will begin working with the firm.

As part of the Marketing and Communications Plan, the Department of Music put together an antihazing/recruitment workshop for high school students and is working with several school districts to present the workshop before the school year ends. Mrs. Saunders informed the Committee that they are also working with various schools and colleges to develop recruitment material and are beginning the process to redesign the university's website.

The university has entered into a one-year contract with DKC who is working on an alumni engagement initiative that will generate positive exposure for the university. Other initiatives are continuing such as the "Living Well 101" effort in which the expertise of faculty is being promoted in newspapers locally, statewide and nationally. Mrs. Saunders advised that they continue to produce 60 second vignettes promoting university achievements, research and activities.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 4:31 p.m.

Subject: University Advancement Update on BOT Goals

Summary:

The efforts of University Advancement to enhance institutional fundraising continue to progress on an upward trajectory with an increase over last year's performance. As of June 30 we closed the Fiscal Year at \$3.2M, a 59% goal attainment and 0.9% ahead of the 2011-12 Fiscal Year total of \$3.1M. This slight increase in fundraising was achieved with 11% fewer donors (FY 2011 - 3,660 vs FY 2012 - 3,242). The attached DSO Committee Dashboard shots and Summary demonstrate the fundraising performance in terms of Fiscal Year 2012 goal vs actual, the comparison of FY 2011 vs FY 2012 and goal attainment by constituency and purpose.

The University Advancement report will examine the University's fundraising data and constituent giving trends, and outline the direction, objectives, activities and criteria for success that are being undertaken to address the comprehensive approach to enhance and continue progress to improve institutional fundraising and provide support to the University Community. Included will be a preview of the new Student Scholarship Portal, a preview of the President's Club and an introduction of specific tools and initiatives to tap and engage Board Members in sharing their sphere of influence in helping FAMU identify, connect and build productive and enduring relationships with affluent and influential donor prospects.

Fiscal Year to Date (FYTD) investment portfolio returns for the nine months ended March 31, 2013 matched the portfolio's composite benchmark returns of 10.87%, and outperformed the portfolio's investment goal by 456 basis points. Returns for the trailing 12 months slightly underperformed both the portfolio's composite benchmark returns, and the investment goal by 95 basis points, and 47 basis points, respectively.

The trailing twelve months returns as of 3/31/13 far exceeded returns for the same period ended 3/31/12, while returns for the same period ended 3/31/11 were 87 basis points greater than the 3/31/13 returns. The returns for the trailing twelve months ended 3/31/12 were much lower than the other two years in the table due to high negative returns during the last two calendar quarters of 2011 that were the result of extreme market volatility following the credit downgrade of U.S. Government Debt in August 2011.

The slight tweaks to the asset allocation guidelines, and target allocations that were approved by the Foundation's Board of Directors in November 2012, had not been implemented as of 3/31/13, and the investmen return goal remains unchanged.

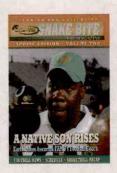

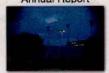
