

HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2021-2022

ENROLLMENT AND CERTIFICATION (processing requests to use VA education benefits)

- Current Enrollment Number by Category
 - 81 Active Duty (includes Reservists & Guardsmen)
 - 460 Military-Dependents/Spouses
 - 104 Veterans



This represents an overall 14.2% increase in the number of military-connected students that received VA financial support. <u>Our goal was 5%, therefore we doubled the increase.</u>





HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2021-2022

- Student Financial Support
 - The total federal GI Bill support for military-affiliated students 2020-2021 was \$2,115,050*
 - Total federal GI Bill support for military-affiliated students for 2021-22 was \$ 2,829,276 *
 - <u>This represents a 38% increase in student aid and tuition revenue from military-</u> <u>affiliated student enrollment and usage of military education benefits</u>
 - The departments also received revenue based on the number of certification requests processed each year; these funds are deposited into the FAMU Foundation account and used for military student support
 - \$6128 was earned for 2020-21
 - \$7472 was earned for 2021-22

*These numbers represent the total amount in tuition and fees paid directly to the university as well as stipends paid directly to the student.
